SUMMARY

This article analyzes the constitutional and political foundations of restrictions on access to firearm ownership by the civilian population in Brazil, with emphasis on Law No. 10.826/2003 (Disarmament Statute) and its repercussions on the fundamental rights to self-defense and individual autonomy. The research examines the compatibility of the imposed limitations with the constitutional principles of proportionality, reasonableness, and freedom, as well as the effects of the restrictive model on the distribution of power between the State and civil society. The methodology adopted is a bibliographic, normative, jurisprudential, and documentary review. The results reveal that the maintenance of high rates of homicide by firearm, after more than two decades of the Statute's enactment, demonstrates the insufficiency of the restrictive policy when unaccompanied by robust investments in public security. It concludes that the broad prohibition of civilian armament, without a corresponding strengthening of capacity...

The State, in providing effective and immediate protection, may represent a disproportionate limitation on individual autonomy and a silent transfer of vulnerability from the State to the citizen.

ABSTRACT

This article analyzes the constitutional and political foundations of restrictions on civilian access to firearms in Brazil, focusing on Law No. 10,826/2003 (Disarmament Statute) and its effects on the fundamental rights to self-defense and individual autonomy. The research examines the compatibility of the imposed limitations with the constitutional principles of proportionality, reasonableness, and individual freedom, as well as the practical effects of the restrictive model on the balance of power between the State and civil society. The methodology consists of a bibliographic, normative, jurisprudential, and documentary review. Results show that persistently high firearm homicide rates after more than two decades of the Statute in force reveal the policy's insufficiency when not accompanied by robust public security investments. The study concludes that broad restrictions on civilian armament, absent a corresponding strengthening of state capacity to provide effective and immediate protection, may represent a disproportionate limitation on individual autonomy and a silent transfer of vulnerability from the State to the citizen.

1 INTRODUCTION

Law No. 10,826/2003, popularly known as the Disarmament Statute, was approved with the aim of reducing violence by restricting the circulation of firearms, transferring, more explicitly, to the State the responsibility for protecting citizens in national territory. Among its main restrictive and bureaucratic conditions, currently, is the requirement to prove profound need and discretionary (subjective) authorization by part of the Federal Police, both for possession (within the limits of the home and/or workplace) and for carrying. (without location and/or time restrictions) of the firearm.

On October 23, 2005, the so-called Gun Referendum took place, held throughout the country. national territory, with the objective of consulting the Brazilian population regarding the veto on the acquisition and to the commercialization of weapons and ammunition. And even with the Brazilian population being predominantly Contrary to Law No. 10.826/2003, the referendum was ignored and disregarded by politicians and government officials. of that time.

Public security in Brazil is addressed in Article 144 of the 1988 Federal Constitution; It constitutes a duty of the State, while at the same time recognizing it as a right and responsibility of the whole of society, demonstrating that the State must act as guarantor of public order, upon which The primary obligation of protection falls upon the primary responsibility, a guideline that finds its basis in fundamental rights. to life, as provided for in article 5 of the same constitutional text.

Given this scenario, the problem guiding this research is: the denial of access to The arming of the civilian population, as structured by the Disarmament Statute, violates the right to legitimate self-defense and violates constitutionally guaranteed individual autonomy, insofar as imposes disproportionate restrictions, without the State demonstrating the capacity to provide the necessary protection.

Does it take away from the citizen?

The data collection instruments were developed through documentary research and Bibliographic research in reliable databases, such as the Brazilian Forum on Public Security and the Sou Institute. of Peace, the Library of the Supreme Federal Court (STF) and, for the processing of information internationally, the Education Resources Information Center (ERIC), a free platform Developed by the United States Department of Education.

The study was systematized, taking into account national parameters related to safety. public, including the rates of armed violence recorded in Brazil and the practical effects of Disarmament policies, crime, and legitimate citizen access to firearms.

3 RESULTS

Among these, the following stand out: Decree No. 9,847, of June 25, 2019 (BRAZIL, 2019a), the Decree No. 10,030, of September 30, 2019 (BRAZIL, 2019b), Decree No. 10,627, of February 12, 2021 (BRAZIL, 2021a), and Decree No. 10,628, of February 12, 2021 (BRAZIL, 2021b). However, these measures were frequently suspended, partially or totally, by injunctions. from the Supreme Federal Court due to questions of constitutionality, in addition to They face opposition in the Federal Senate, which highlights the normative weakness of these initiatives and The lack of institutional consensus on the matter.

Between 2022 and 2023, the state of Amapá stood out in a way Worrying: its homicide rate has risen from 33.0 to an alarming 48.3 per 100,000 inhabitants. an increase of 46.4%, making it the only federative unit to present growth exceeding 10% in the analyzed period. Besides Amapá, only two other states... In 2023, several states surpassed the threshold of 30 homicides per 100,000 inhabitants. committed with firearms: Bahia, with 36.6, and Pernambuco, with 30.8, numbers that, by themselves, They highlight the unequal distribution of armed violence across the national territory and the inadequacy of current public policies in certain regions.

The normative analysis of the Disarmament Statute reveals a lack of criteria. Objective and measurable criteria for granting authorization for possession and carrying of firearms, conferring upon the Police Federal discretionary power of a subjective nature that, in practice, makes legitimate access impossible. from the average citizen to the armament of their own (BRAZIL, 2003). In this context, the absence of objective criteria for granting permits to carry and possess licenses, coupled with the silence of the Supreme Federal Court regarding the material limits of restrictions on the right individual self-defense creates a zone of constitutional uncertainty that falls directly on the average citizen. The discretion granted to the Federal Police, of an essentially ordinary nature. 4. DISCUSSION

The progressively intensified restrictive stance taken by the State, although justified. institutionally under the argument of preserving public order and reducing violence, This is facing increasing opposition in light of data demonstrating the persistence of high rates. armed crime persists even after decades of the Disarmament Statute being in effect.
